- 2. Purpose have a purpose-filled mindset
- 3. Down shift pray often to keep focused
- 4. 80% rule eat until 80% full
- 5. Plant slant plant-based diet
- 6. Right tribe connect with groups who share the same life purpose
- 7. Loved ones first acknowledge parents and family needs before your own
- 8. Belong to a positive, supportive social structure Activity:
- 1. Look at goals within your reach.
- 2. Decrease food intake by 1/4 and eat one cookie instead of two.
- 3. Sit on the floor.

Relationships:

- 1. Find humor in the challenges.
- 2. Be full of compliments, not complaints.
- 3. Never stop loving unconditionally, but always refuse to argue.

Existence:

- 2. Your passions are your tools for leading you to the people you need to serve.

Open Enrollment For The 2021-22 School Year

To begin the process, go to our new and improved website: www.ukiahjracademy.org.

Once there, click the dropdown menu at the top center/right labeled "Parents", then click the link "FACTS Family Portal Login".

Login to your account using uk-ca for the district code. You will use the same username and password you used to enroll this year. (If you have not created an account, click the link for creating a new account).

Once in the portal click "Apply/ Enroll", then "Enrollment/Re-enrollment". You should find a link for the 2021-22 school year for each current student. Click on the link "Start Enrollment Packet".

You will notice the registration fees have changed. We have consolidated the registration, supply, book rental, and lab supply fees altogether. The registration fees for grades K-4 is \$425.00 and for grades 5-10, it is \$550.00.

We are offering a 10% discount on registration, if paid before June 11, the last day of school. You will find these discounts reflected in the enrollment packet.

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A Lesson from Nature

Cicadas

If you have lived in the Midwest or parts of the Southern United States, you have likely heard the drone of the adult cicada. As you are reading this, large areas of Ohio and Indiana are experiencing the emergence of Brood X (10). (There are 23 distinct different broods of cicadas in the United States.) Billions of Brood X adult cicadas emerge every 17 years. They will spend the next 4-6 weeks of their adult lives making a literal buzz to attract mates. After mating, the female will lay eggs in the branches and die. Out of the eggs will emerge the cicada nymph, a juvenile cicada. The nymph, about the size of a grain of rice, will fall to the ground and burrow down the roots of the tree where they will suck on sap from the roots.

The cicadas are not harmful to people. They are not venomous and do not sting, they will not eat our crops or harm flower gardens, and they are not the biblical locust. Their most aggravating feature is that they make a buzz that is 80-100 decibels loud, about the same amount of noise from a motorcycle or lawnmower. They could gather in as dense a group as 1.5 million per acre in some areas. Imagine the noise! After this spring's emergence of billions of cicadas, the next appearance of Brood X won't be until spring of 2038 when the soil warms to about 64 degrees and the circle of life begins again.

God has instilled in his creation a cycle and rhythm: the yearly cycle of the Earth and its four distinct seasons, the monthly cycle of the moon influencing the tides, the weekly cycle ending with the rest and renewal of the Sabbath, and the quirky 17 year cycle of cicadas in Brood X who emerge for just 4-6 weeks to reproduce before their life ends. Look around nature for the other cycles of life that occur. God has given us the world of nature to enjoy. Let us enjoy this blessing daily, even if it is a cicada.
