Some people have been asking about the ways to give offerings here at church after all the changes of this last year. 1. ATTEND. At this time church is open on Sabbath morning with the worship service beginning at 11:00am. There is a box just inside the back door, center aisle, to receive your offering. This can be your tithe envelopes, filled out with your name and address, in order to receive a receipt at the end of the year. Also, fill out the items on the tithe envelope where you want your offering to go. All of the cash that is put into the box will go toward the designated offering of the day as listed in the bulletin. 2. **COME.** Bring your offering to the church during the week and give it to the church secretary. The church office hours are Monday-Thursday 8:00am to 1:00pm. If the doors are locked, there is a doorbell on the back door on the north side of the church. Or drop your envelope in the lock mailbox out by the curb.

3. **USPS.** You can mail you tithes and offerings to the church.

4. ONLINE. Go to website ukiahsda.com. Scroll down to online giving, and fill in the blanks. If you don't find the offering choice that you are desiring, you will notice that under each category there is a choice for "More Offering Categories", hit on that and it will give you more choices than see on the first list. If you still don't see the category that you want. I guess that you will need to write a check and use choices 1-3 above. ONLINE giving is a safe way to give and every \$\$ that you give to the church or project is transferred to the church. The fees are not passed on to the local church. The totals are transferred to our local bank account twice a month.

May God bless each of you as you give your tithes and offerings. It is a pleasure to participate together in the finances of the church.

A Lesson from Nature by Shari Kim

Have you ever tried to put a 1,000-piece puzzle together without looking at the picture on the box first? The pieces are small and seem to be the same shape and color. It's difficult to piece everything together without seeing the whole picture and understanding exactly where it all fits together.

Eyes are incredibly complex and intricate. I won't go into detail on human eyes but I want to focus on how surprisingly intricate insect eyes can be. I never really thought much about insect eyes because I'm usually concerned about getting the insects out of my house. But when I started reading about their eyes, I was amazed at how much detail God puts into these tiny critters.

Many insects have both simple and compound eyes. They usually have three simple eyes that form a triangle between their compound eyes. The simple eyes only distinguish between light and dark. Most insects have two compound eyes that are made up of individual lenses that fit together like a honeycomb. The amount of lenses varies drastically between various types of insects. For example, the worker ant has six lenses while the dragonfly has 30,000 lenses. Each lens gives an image and they all work together to make up the whole picture. Insects are only able to see a short distance; however, they do see movements and a broader range of light rays.

When Joseph was a young lad, he didn't know what was ahead of him in life. He didn't know that he would spend 17 years as a son under his father's care, 10 years as a slave under Potiphar, 3 years as a prisoner in bondage and 80 years as a ruler over Egypt. He didn't see the picture on the puzzle box before the puzzle was being pieced together, but God was able to see the big picture and worked something good out of a bad situation years in advance for Joseph and his family.

We, too, are often short-sighted. We don't see the full picture, but we serve a God who does and is in control of the future. That doesn't mean that it's always easy because it definitely wasn't for Joseph. But God does promise us in 2 Corinthians 4:17 that "our light affliction which is but for a moment, worth for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory." God sees the future and He is working it out for you right now. All we have to do is pray that God gives us "compound" eyesight so we can see how He is working in our life, even when we can't see the big picture or how all the puzzle pieces fit together.
