Our God Is Able

"He will feed His flock like a shepherd; He will gather the lambs with His arm, and carry them in His bosom, and gently lead those who are with young. Have you not known? Have you not heard? The everlasting God, the Lord, the Creator of the ends of the earth, neither faints nor is weary. His understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the weak, and to those who have no might He increases strength. Even the youths shall faint and be weary, and the young men shall utterly fall, but those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint." Isaiah 40: 11, 28-31

Imagine you are in charge of directing three million people who have camped in a 750 square-mile area to meet at a certain location, line up according to divisions and begin marching to a destination. You would be given an ample five-hour timeframe to accomplish this, but there would be no technical or electronic devices to help you facilitate organization or communication. Would you be able to fulfill this assignment? "Of course not," returns your answer.

Such were the circumstances that faced Moses leading the Israelites in their exodus from Egypt for 40 years. What was he going to do with them? They had to be fed and feeding 3 million people required a lot of food.

According to a quartermaster of the American army during the Civil War, men carried an eight-day supply of food that weighed 24 pounds. Using this information for calculating, Moses would have needed 4,500 tons of food every day. To visualize this requirement, the food would have filled two freight trains each pulling 32 cars for just one day!

They were traveling through the desert and would need firewood to use in cooking their food and for keeping warm. To haul enough wood would take 56 freight cars carrying 8,000 tons for just one day!

Oh yes, the Israelites would certainly need water every day. If they had only enough water to drink and wash a few dishes, it would take 11 million gallons each day and a freight train with tank cars 1,800 miles long, just to bring their daily water! But wait! The Israelites would have required far more than that—they had millions of thirsty animals traveling with them, so figure three times that much water at the very least.

And then, don't forget about crossing the Red Sea. If their pathway accommodated a double file, the line would have been 800 miles long and would have required 35 days and nights to cross. There had to be a pathway three miles wide so that they could walk 5,000 abreast to cross in one night. (Received this information in an email from my cousin John Wells)

Do you think Moses thought through all of these situations before he left Egypt? I think not. Moses believed in God and God took care of all these logistical challenges for him. Now, do you think God has any problems taking care of ALL your needs, now or in the future?

The well-known little chorus, written by Milton Brunson, comes to mind:

He's able, He's able, I know He's able, I know My Lord is able to carry me through.

Discipleship Talks

The objective of the focus on discipleship has been to train, equip and empower our members to become disciples of Jesus and then sharing with their friends, family and community. To review, we have printed three talks on how to be a disciple. This month, we are going to look at how to welcome people into community.

"Worshiping Together - What to Expect"

How many of us were born into the church or raised Seventh-Day Adventist from a young age? I was. What a blessing, right?..., however, this could be a barrier that causes us to not understand what someone we have invited to church or a visitor is feeling when worshiping with us. It is important to take a moment to put ourselves in their shoes, to consider how the experience might be viewed from their perspective.

I recently asked someone who is new to the faith how they felt their first few times worshiping at church. In addition, I asked what would have been helpful for them to know beforehand or during the service that would have positively impacted the experience. They replied,

"Something I was missing when I started going was acceptance. I went, I sat through the service, I left. There was a sense of something missing. What I was missing was someone to take me under their wing and bring me into fellowship with a group. The first thing people notice is if the members are clickish, stand-offish or friendly to new people. The biggest impact to getting new people to keep coming is feeling the love of God from its members. What we do has more impact on others than anything they hear from the pulpit." What great feedback and so true!

When discipling and worshiping together with those who are new, it can be beneficial to set some expectations before attending a service so they know what church will be like. We can highlight church as an opportunity to collectively worship and spend time with God. Provide ample time to answer questions they might have and give helpful information that we can sometimes overlook or take for granted.

Helpful information to share includes:

- The name and location of the church
- The church website
- Time of services
- Names of our pastoral team
- Tips for parking as well as where to enter the building
- Even the location of restrooms

Regarding the service itself, explain the general flow of the program. Tell of how we enjoy incorporating music, the blessing of the children's story, our opportunity to give offerings, and of course the sermon. Ultimately, act as their guide through the worship service. Don't forget to define unfamiliar terms, such as "haystacks".

Building relationships is key. Be sure to introduce guests to your friends and other church members before and after the worship service. Lastly, food does wonders to deepen relationships. Invite people to a meal at your home or a church potluck.

Discipling is a collaborative church effort: Part of an article from Ministry Magazine issued April, 1979 states:

Evangelism must be seen in terms of making disciples and not just getting decisions. It is the perennial work of the entire church and not a special work of special people on special occasions. In every phase of evangelism the church is clearly seen as the focal point. Certainly the church has a primary role in caring for new converts.

What is this saying? Discipling is an ongoing act of evangelism for each of us and toward others, completed with the involvement of the whole church. Ellen G. White wrote on this subject:

Those who have newly come to the faith should be patiently and tenderly dealt with, and it is the duty of the older members of the church to devise ways and means to provide help and sympathy and instruction for those who have conscientiously withdrawn from other churches. . . . The church has a special responsibility laid upon her to attend to these souls who have followed the first rays of light they have received...." Evangelism, p. 351.

Matthew 13: 18-19 says, "Listen then to what the parable of the sower means: When anyone hears the message about the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what was sown in their heart. This is the seed sown along the path.

Church family, the challenge for us today, this week, and each day beyond is to do our part, discipling and providing understanding, so that all will be prepared for Jesus' return.

- 2 c basil, stems removed (packed)
- 3 T pine nuts or walnuts
- 3 cloves garlic (peeled)
- 2 T lemon juice
- 3-4 T nutritional yeast
- 1/4 t sea sat (more to taste)
- 2-3 T extra virgin olive oil
- 3 T water (plus more as needed for desired consistency)

- 1-dry ingredients with lemon juice
- 2-slowly add and mix oil while blending
- 3-Add water slowly while blending to desires consistency

A Lesson From Nature

Many people see things growing on rocks and assume it's moss, but it actually might be lichen. Their appearance are similar, but they are very different. Lichen are not plants as they do not have stems, roots or leaves. They are organisms that are made of both fungus and algae with the algae portion being what allows it to photosynthesize. The most common surface lichen live on are rocks, trees and soil, although they can be found on anything that doesn't move long enough for them to attach and grow. They absorb nutrients, water and even harmful toxins in the air through their cortex. They are poikilohydric, which means they are dependent on their environment for their water content. When they are wet, they are actively photosynthesizing and growing, but when they are dry, they become brittle and lie dormant. They can be used for shelter, building materials for animals, dyes, clothing, decorations, and even toothpaste and deodorant.

I became interested in lichen when my kids started singing a song called "Doing My Best." It's an eleven verse song about how various things in nature teach us to do our best for God despite not being as strong or big as something else. The words go like this: "I am just a simple lichen, but I teach a helpful lesson, though I cannot talk. Raging storms may fell an oak tree, but they cannot ever hurt me, clinging to the rock." This verse has stuck with me more than any other verse because I find the words so simple but so profound. Can anything ever hurt us when we are clinging to God, our Rock?

David refers to God as his Rock several times throughout Psalms. There are many times when David is in trouble and it seems that all he has is the assurance that "the Lord is my Rock and my Fortress and my Deliverer; My God, my Strength, in whom I will trust" (Psalm 18:2). God is the only sure Rock for us to hold on to in this uncertain world.

There may be storms brewing around us, but we just have to be like the lichen and cling to the Rock. We may not be as strong as an oak tree in our own strength but with the strength of God, we can be stronger if we cling to Him. And that's really the bottom line - we have to cling as though our lives depend on it because our eternal life does depend on it. Are you clinging to the Rock like the lichen?
