

"I'm going to share an almost unbelievable story, but it's true! It just happened a couple weeks ago.



My husband is a pastor in the state of Oregon and it was opening night of our evangelistic series, "Revelation of Hope." I had been encouraging more prayer in our church, so I decided that I would oversee a prayer room during the series. My team consists of mostly homebound elderly or people praying from their homes, so I wasn't sure how much participation I would have during the meetings. I decided to create a prayer room anyway, hoping that some church members would be willing to come in and pray periodically during the meetings.

That first Friday night it was just me. I felt alone, but I prayed anyway. Again, Sabbath evening, it was just me. I felt a bit more discouraged. I put on a beautiful rendition of "The Lord's Prayer." While it played, I prayed. "I know that where two or three are gathered together in Your name, You are there Lord, but what if it is just me?" I prayed silently.

When the song finished, I opened my eyes and the room was full of angels. I started crying as I looked around the room in amazement. The angels were tall, as tall as the ceiling, with broad shoulders. They stood shoulder to shoulder with their backs to the wall, around the edges of the room. I felt tiny compared to them. They had wings and wore flowing robe-like clothes. I was drawn to their faces. They looked like men, very handsome men. Their eyes were so kind and they smiled gentle, comforting smiles. Their facial features were defined and they had a warrior-like atmosphere of boldness about them. Their dark hair flowed down to their shoulders and they looked almost iridescent. Their forms shone with a yellow, white color. I was

only able to see them for four or five seconds and then they were gone, but I couldn't stop crying for the rest of the evening.

I had been so discouraged, wondering if God could work if it was only me in the prayer room. He showed me in a miraculous way that if one person is praying, it is enough. I feel so unworthy and humbled that God would give me this great gift. I still cry often as I think about this sacred experience. I continue to pray in our church prayer room alone, but I am no longer discouraged, for I know the room is full of angels even though I can't see them.

We must never estimate the power of prayer. Even if just one person is praying, that's enough. God is at work even though we can't see Him."

We have a serious need to fund our new church roof before this summer. This winter the children's Sabbath School suffered the most for lack of a rain cover. We don't want to go through another winter with the leaks we had this winter.



A Lesson from Nature

We know that God created the world and all that is on the Earth. An excellent example of God's intelligent design is the leaf cutter ant. The leaf cutter ant lives in Central America, South America, Mexico, and parts of the southern United States. They are a communal animal and next to humans, these ants form some of the largest and most complex societies. Some of the nests can be almost 100 feet across with up to eight million individual ants living in the colony.

These ants can carry up to twenty times their weight. The name leaf cutter tells you the labor that they undertake. The ants cut leaves, flowers, and grasses, not to eat them, but to use these plant parts as a medium to grow fungus. The ants collect the plant parts, grow the fungus, and remove mold and pests. It is hard to imagine this intricate relationship evolving on its own. The fungus needs the ants to stay alive. The adults eat the sap from the plant, but the fungus is the food for the ant larvae. The ant and fungus have a mutualistic relationship. Here we have an excellent example of God's intelligent design in creating even the smallest living things on Earth. If God designed this ant and fungus relationship, imagine what He wants to do in our lives.

It has been a very exciting time here at our Blue Zones Project in Mendocino County. We conducted a very successful kickoff event which included nearly 20 local community organizations showcasing the services that they conduct in the community. We had four local food vendors discussing the importance and value of plantbased food and cooking. We had three local dance groups (a local hip-hop dance group, line dancing, as well as a Mexican cultural dance group), an all-women's soccer game and expo, build your own mini succulent pot, and a smoothie bike. She has recruited a number of church and community members to join her on a walking journey. We were able to hand out Blue Zones Project Tshirts to the women who joined and we had a fantastic hour long walk that gave us an opportunity to connect, share stories, and support one another. We are called to share God's love and the good news of His soon return. These social groups can be an essential outreach opportunity.
