Pathfinders



What is WASC and why were they at UJA? By Rick Nelson, Principal UJA

During the first week of this April, UJA was visited by a group from WASC (Western Association of Schools and Colleges) for 4 days, April 3-6. The purpose of the visit was the last step to gaining WASC Accreditation for UJA for the first time. Accreditation through WASC is important because for a number of reasons. High school credit from WASC accredited schools is accepted without question throughout the country. Also, the WASC accreditation process is very thorough and helped us define who we are and how we can grow and improve as a school.

The visiting team consisted of a conference education associate superintendent, a retired SDA principal, a retired public school superintendent and a non-parochial school administer. The team was impressed with the positive climate of UJA, as well as the quality of the teaching staff.

UJA spent the previous three months working through the self-study process and put together a school improvement plan that the WASC visiting team looked over and offered suggestions to improve. It was through this self-study process that UJA determined that a primary area of growth needed at UJA was in the area of academic instruction to improve student learning, specifically in the area of Mathematics.

The school improvement plan is a multi-year process that focuses on a specific area each year with the overall goal of improving student learning in all areas:

2021-2022 - Creating a safe, supportive and collaborative culture

2022-2023 - Promoting effective teaching in every classroom

2023-2024 - Ensuring a guaranteed and viable curriculum

2024-2025 - Developing standards-referenced reporting

2025-2026 - Striving for competency-based education
