# **Songs of Experience**

"The Lord is my strength and song, and He has become my salvation; He is my God, and I will praise Him." Exodus 15:2

This verse sounds like it could be one of David's Psalms, but it is the song that Moses and all of the children of Israel sang after their miraculous crossing of the Red Sea. Solely and collectively, they had experienced His awesome power. They were amazed recipients of His incredible deliverance from the pursuing Egyptian army who were closing in on them.

Imagine the utter surprise of the Israelites when they saw the Red Sea open before them, forming two enormous walls of water on either side of a dry pathway. Imagine their astonishment when after they had safely passed through to the other side, the walls of water came crashing down upon their enemies, killing them all.

From this story, we can know that the same God who delivered the Israelites is able to deliver us when we face formidable challenges. In the impossibilities of life, God opens the way. In the trying circumstances of life, God has the solution. In the darkest of nights, God's light shines through. It is our God who opens the "Red Seas" of our life experiences too. He is the One who gives us a song to sing.

It probably wasn't always easy for Fanny Crosby to understand that God guides in each aspect of life's experiences. Although she was blind, God gave her a new vision. He placed a song in her heart—and not just a song, but more than 8,000 of them. Fanny Crosby saw much more than many of the people around her. In the eyes of her mind, she saw God's amazing mercy, forgiveness, power, and love. She once wrote, "I have always believed that the good Lord, in His infinite mercy, by this means (my blindness) consecrated me to the work I am still permitted to do."

Her hymns have brought meaningful revelations to generations of Christians. One of her gospel songs that sums up her philosophy of life is "All the Way." The hymn ends with a glorious refrain "When I wake to life immortal, wing my flight to realms of day, this my song through endless ages, Jesus led me all the way; this my song through endless ages, Jesus led me all the way."

May we courageously unite our voices with people like the ancient Israelites and Fanny Crosby in a mighty chorus, "This my song through endless ages, Jesus led me all the way."

A favorite quotation from Mrs. Ellen White is "God never leads His children otherwise than they would choose to be led, if they could see the end from the beginning, and discern the glory of the purpose which they are fulfilling as co-workers with Him." Desire of Ages, p. 224.

The surrender expressed in this prayer is an open door for Jesus to enter and take control. "Lord, take my heart, for I cannot give it. It is Thy property. Keep it pure, for I cannot keep it for Thee. Save me in spite of myself, my weak, un-christlike self. Mold me, fashion me, raise me into a pure and holy atmosphere, where the rich current of Thy love can flow through my soul." Christ's Object Lessons, p. 159. By Donna Faye Anderson



Look for our table at the Fall Festival. We will be selling bags of Butler's Vegan Jerky." YUM!!!


