"But God demonstrated His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." Romans 5:8

Capturing the scene in our mind's eye, we see Jesus, the Son of God, hanging on a cruel cross to declare to this world the message that God loves us!

Christ's death on the cross completely eradicated Satan's accusations that God's law is impossible to keep, His promises are not trustworthy, and His words are unreliable. Once a glorious angel in heaven, he chose to rebel against and reject God's incredible love.

O love of God, how rich and pure! How measureless and strong! It shall forevermore endure—the saints' and angels' song."

In Romans 8, Paul speaks of four things that Christ's followers do not have: In Christ there is no condemnation. Romans 8:1. Because of what Jesus did for us, all condemnation is gone. We are acquitted, pardoned, forgiven, and set free from sin's debilitating guilt. Since Jesus bore our guilt on the cross, we need not bear it.

In Christ there is no bondage. Romans 8:15. As Christians we may make mistakes, but we are no longer in bondage to sin. Sin no longer dominates or controls our lives. Jesus has broken this bondage.

In Christ there is no ultimate defeat. Romans 8:28. "And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God." As Christ's followers, we are not in the hands of the evil one. We are not living with no purpose or direction. God is in control of our lives and will work all things together for our good.

In Christ there is no separation. Romans 8:35 asks: "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?" Paul lists tribulation, distress, persecution, famine, nakedness, peril, and sword. Christ's love penetrates our darkest, most trying moment. We can rely on His promise that He will never leave us or forsake us.

When we place our lives in the awesome love of God, He imparts to us His strength. A life of love is a life of unshakable faith and immovable resistance against evil. 
Pathfinders



Botswana Orphan Project by Sandy Wirth





Steve and I were missionaries in Kenya and Botswana from 1988-1994 and last November, we traveled with our children, Peter and Sharon, to revisit some of the former locations.

Since we left Botswana, the AIDS epidemic swept through and caused many children to be orphaned. Today there is still a high prevalence of HIV/AIDS and many children are being raised by grandparents. In 2004, a friend of ours in Botswana was impressed to start the orphan centers to care for these children. There are currently six centers in the Botswana Orphan Project that provide food, clothing, and schooling for these needy children.

Because of the generous donations of the Ukiah church family, we were able to bring several large boxes of clothing, books and toys, as well as cash to purchase food to distribute to the centers. We visited two of the centers: Manyana, "Place of Hope", and Thamaga, "Place of Blessings". We were welcomed with songs by the children and much gratitude by the staff, especially the cooks, who received the food with big smiles and who also broke into songs of thanks. It was rewarding to bring such joy to at least a small corner of the world.

Blue Zones Project, LLC

The Mendocino County Food Policy Council

The Mendocino County Food Policy Council (MCFPC) was formed in 2010 by a group of grassrootscommunity leaders passionate about building equitable systems for food access. Since then, MCFPC has been recognized nationally as a model for its impact and structure. The MCFPC's mission is to promote a fair and sustainable local food system through research, collaboration and collective advocacy.

Over the last few years, MCFPC has undergone a comprehensive, strategic-planning process, including a series of regional summits held through 2020 and 2021, and by a discovery process completed by Blue Zones Project LLC in early 2022. Lucy Bartholomew, the Public Policy Advocate for Blue Zones Project Mendocino County, collaborates with the Mendocino County Food Policy Council.

The scope of work of a Food Policy Council spans advocating for specific legislation, educating the public and decision makers, providing a venue for networking between food security programs, improving coordination within a food system, and implementing projects. The work of MCFPC is dynamic and flexes to input from the community, opportunities presented, and committee member assets. Some identified priority projects include: 1) establishing a food-insecurity screening, as a part of patient intake with healthcare providers that do not already do so; 2) share necessary referrals and resources to meet patient needs; 3) updating institutional wellness policies to reduce or eliminate sugar-sweetened beverages; 4) adopt good food-purchasing programs that support farm-to-cafeteria purchasing from local producers; 5) enhancing infrastructure that supports urban agriculture, and more.



The Wild Turkey, Meleageris gallopavo, is a beautiful bird that lives across most of America. In fact, Benjamin Franklin would have preferred the Wild Turkey to the Bald Eagle as the National Bird and symbol of the United States. Wild Turkeys usually walk or run as they go about the day. You might not know it, but they are strong fliers! When startled, they may take flight to escape the threat. Interestingly they roost high in trees overnight to keep clear of predators.

Turkeys have a wide range of habitats: woods, mountain forests, and wooded swamps. The one thing these habitats have in common is trees. It is the oak tree that the turkey is fond of because acorns are their favorite food. We sure have an abundance of acorns around Ukiah! In addition to acorns, turkeys scratch around seeds, grains, roots, and bulbs. They also eat insects, spiders, and snails. Occasionally they have been known to eat frogs, lizards, snakes, salamanders, and crabs. The turkey is most actively foraging in the early morning and evening. Turkeys are a great animal to have around for pest control.

Turkeys are in the same family as pheasants and grouse. People are surprised that they aren't related to chickens. Maybe that is due to chicken and turkey products being near each other in the grocery store. Comparatively, the barnyard variety of turkeys is not as intelligent. This lack of smarts is where the insult of calling someone a turkey has arisen. Furthermore, farm-yard turkeys are so selectively bred for meat that they are unable to reproduce on their own and need to be artificially inseminated.

The differences between farm yard turkeys and Wild Turkeys draw a comparison to being in the world but not of the world. If we are to be like the Wild Turkey we will be wary of the one who prowls around like a lion looking for someone to devour. (1 Peter 5:8) We will search out and find good food to eat, and flee when danger approaches. But, as we scratch out and search for God, we will not become lazy and unintelligent like the farm-yard turkey.

Look for the beauty that is around us here in Ukiah and I am sure you will stumble upon and perhaps startle the beautiful Wild Turkey.
