## Radio Opportunity for the Redwood Empire

Last fall we learned that the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) was going to give away 4 FM low-power broadcast frequencies on a lottery basis in Ukiah. We put in for one for English and one for Spanish to be able to preach the true Bible message 24-7 to the Ukiah area. Just before one of our frequencies had been approved for a low-power station, we learned that a popular high-power local station was for sale for \$80,000. The church has voted to buy the station and many of you have begun funding it or have pledged to do so. The broker, who is handling the sale, told us we should offer \$68,000 for various reasons. The broker is swamped with sales, so it is taking time to get a response from the seller. We hope to hear soon.

Some are saying that radio is an old media and is going away. Nielsen ratings tell a different story: 92% of US <u>adults</u> are listening to the radio every week. That is 121.5 million US listeners weekly in 2021, more than any other platform.

Sabbath morning, April 13, I met a lady at church who had not been to church for many years. She had driven the day before from Eureka to Ukiah. She told how most of the way she had listened to Adventist preaching on the radio. That inspired her to come to church the next day. On that mountainous highway, she felt the angels must have let her have a solid signal to hear an Adventist preacher without missing anything. We praised the Lord with her. It turns out there is a new Adventist station, KADV 89.1, on a mountain above Garberville. I believe God sent this lady to us just now as a "proof of concept" to show us He wants the word to go out here as well. Please give to radio both online and in tithe envelopes to "Radio". If you want to help the Spanish radio to get started, give to "Spanish Radio." God will bless!

### <u>Update on Medical Missions</u>

To tell the full story, we have to go back to March 8-10 when Keilani's aunt and uncle, Josef and Katie Ludwig from Hendersonville, North Carolina, came to our church and presented the first six out of twelve lessons called the Galilee Protocol. A friend of the Ludwigs, Bill Holt, wrote a book, The Galilee Protocol, that emphasized the medical missionary work and responsibility that has been given to our church through the Bible and the Spirit of Prophecy. It focuses on the method that Christ used to reach the people of His day.

Many of us, while studying the Galilee Protocol lessons, were convicted that God is calling us to a special work to meet the physical, mental and spiritual needs of our community, and with that a conviction that we have been slack for quite some time in seeking to meet those needs.

We were also convicted that we have not been following much of the guidance our church has been given in uniting spiritual and physical/medical healing that started in the early days of our church. We realized that God was calling each one of us personally, and that calling, if ignored, would have significant consequences on us and our church. As we had only been able to get through half of the lessons, a group of those who wished to finish the course continued to meet on Sunday afternoons to see the course through.

Upon completing the course, we again realized that the Lord had put on our hearts the urgency that we act, but we did not know how best to meet the needs of our community. We had many ideas of our own, but with the Lord's guidance, we decided to do a community survey to learn what people in our town actually needed.

A survey was created and on April 14, our small group met and asked the Lord to guide us and give us the courage to go door-to-door and ask our neighbors what needs they had that we, through God's grace and His strength, might be able to meet. We realized that in our own strength, we were incapable of success in this endeavor and asked God to lead us at each new home. We had 4-5 groups of 2-3 people each, who went to different areas in our town and we spent about an hour in the community.

Several people were interested with education on heart disease and diabetes reversal through healthy living; several more were interested in Bible studies. We have met people who are in great need of home repairs, and others who would like help with gardening. On Sunday, April 21, we went out again and the Lord lined us up with some wonderful interactions that showed us that He most certainly is leading this work!

We hope that anyone who reads this report will feel more than welcome to join us on Sundays at 2:00 pm. when we meet at the church first to ask for the Lord's guidance and the power of His Spirit before we go door-to-door.

Danielle knew a retired pastor friend who agreed to shepherd this new little flock. Please



Although clouds kept crossing the sun, they were mostly thin enough to continue seeing the amazing sight. With our eclipse glasses on, we saw the sun slowly go behind the moon, until there was just one small part visible. Then the sun was gone, lights came on all around us, and the crowd cheered.

We took off our eclipse glasses and could see only the sun's corona. I looked in Jim's camera that was on an equatoral gimbal and I could see little red gems on the sides, which were from the sun shining through valleys between lunar mountains—all beautiful sights! That lasted for over 4 minutes, with varying plumes showing around the covered sun. Then it looked like a bright little diamond appeared on the left side, which increased quickly as the sun reappeared. Oceans and quilting are two of my favorite things. In coming to the Mendocino coast, I found that there were others of like mind, so joining Ocean Wave Quilters was an easy decision. Every month there is a meeting with guild business, activities and a show and tell. Some of the guilts and sewing are for community projects, such as "Warm" Welcome Quilts", which are given to newborns; "Chaplain Quilts" to be given out as needed; "Infusion Quilts" which go to the cancer patients, as well as quilts to the Child Protective Services, and "Texture Quilts" to some of the elderly-care facilities. Other projects include sewing "Dress-a-Girl" dresses which are sent to other countries where clothing is not so easily accessible, pet beds and pillow cases. Each of these projects is a way to love

others and give back to the community.


Twice a year, the Ocean Wave Quilters has a small retreat where they get together to sew and socialize. The retreats provide a special time for members to sew, quilt, see projects in progress, talk, learn from the more

experienced members; and learn about what's important to other guild members. The last retreat, March 21-24, was held at Albion Field Station. I was glad to host the retreat, as the laboratory building has a large, well-lit room to accommodate lots of tables for sewing and cutting. (Dave and Donna Faye happened to be at Albion during this retreat and that's the reason you are hearing about quilting).

Once a year, there is a Quilt Show in Fort Bragg. This year is the 28th Show! June 29-30, 2024. 10:00 am – 4:00 pm daily, \$10 entry fee – includes both days. The show will be held at Dana Gray Elementary School in Fort Bragg. There are usually two quilts raffled off. I not only helped to piece the larger quilt entitled, "Around the Countryside," but also quilted it on my long-arm machine.

Quilting has many positive aspects for me. It was something special that my mom and I shared in common and could do projects together. The creative process is challenging and rewarding and can stretch the mind and abilities. The end result is often a warm and snuggly quilt to keep or share. One of my quilts was donated last year to the Glenn Miller Memorial Golf Tournament that raises funds for student scholarships for Ukiah Junior Academy. Some have gone to OWQ projects, but most of them are given away to friends and family.

## The Solar Eclipse

Sandi Wirth and I paid hundreds of dollars for plane tickets, hotels, and rental cars to place ourselves in the path of totality for the solar eclipse in April. This was a "life list" adventure! We decided to chance it anyway.

We woke up to partly cloudy skies and prepared to go to another church member's house for



an eclipse picnic. We passed the time eating, visiting, and cheering every break in the clouds. As the eclipse started, we moved out to lawn chairs in the open and really focused on sun-gazing with our eclipse glasses. At first it looked like other partial eclipses I had seen. But it quickly became apparent that this time the sun and moon were

perfectly aligned. However, it seemed that the clouds got thicker as totality approached.

Suddenly, it became very dark, and the neighborhood nightlights came on. Birds sang their evening songs and quieted. Dogs started barking and it felt like it was after sundown. Then the clouds parted and there it was! We had a clear view of the black disk of the moon with a ring of fire surrounding it.

All the planning, all the travel, all was well worth it for a few seconds of a once-in-a-lifetime sight in the heavens. We couldn't help but think of that glorious day when all eyes will be focused on the sky, watching for a very special break in the clouds. "This same
