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# Three Reasons I Believe the Bible is Exactly What It Claims to Be

When your non-Christian neighbor or co-worker asks why you are a believer in God and Scripture, what do you say? My first instinct is to say something like "I know in my heart that what I believe is true, and I can't imagine living any other way." While that's a good answer, it's not likely to persuade someone who is looking for evidence. If you're wanting to market your business, a professional would encourage you to pick THREE things your business does better than the competition. So here are my top three evidences for my belief in God, or if you prefer, my top three evidences for why I believe the Bible to be exactly what it claims to be:

#### The Dead Sea Scrolls (Archeology)

These ancient 2,000 year-old manuscripts, discovered in 1947, reveal that the Bible has not been altered, even though it has been translated many times. There are portions of all the Bible's books except Esther. The most intact of the scrolls, the scroll of Isaiah, is IDENTICAL to what we have in our Bible today.

Modern biblical criticism doubts the 586 BC date for the writing of the book of Daniel, placing it instead in the first century BC, by another person named Daniel. (After all, how could Daniel possibly have known history so precisely in advance?) Yet in the Dead Sea Scrolls there are multiple complete copies of the book of Daniel, indicating that it was already accepted scripture and in circulation by the time the skeptics believe it was written. This supports the claim that the Bible was written exactly when we thought it was.

#### The Anthropic Principle (Astrophysics and Cosmology)

Many of today's scientists point to the fine-tuned universe enabling life to exist. The finetuning argument is that the universe and the planet on which we all live did not, and could not have come into existence by accident, but were **deliberately and intentionally created to support intelligent life.** 

Eric Metaxas, quoting Stephen Hawking, in *A Brief History of Time*, notes, "It would be difficult to explain why the universe would have begun in just this way, except as the act of a God who intended to create beings like us." \* (\*quoted from *Is Atheism Dead? by Eric Metaxas*)

Astrophysicist Fred Hoyle has this to say: "A common-sense interpretation of the facts suggests that **a super intellect** has monkeyed with physics, as well as with chemistry and biology, and that there are no blind forces worth speaking about in nature." \*

#### The "Watergate" Effect (Psychology, Human Behavior)

Charles Colson, in his book, *Loving God*, compares the response of the disciples to the resurrection of Jesus with the response of the Watergate conspirators to the Watergate cover-up. I find this comparison insightful.

As the conspiracy unraveled, the Watergate conspirators certainly faced disgrace, loss of their jobs, and possible jail time (probably a minimum-security facility, for a few months). Yet their scripted conspiracy—the story they all agreed upon—fell apart in a couple weeks. When you know it's a lie, you will bail to save your skin and get the best "deal" possible.

Now consider the disciples. Not only were they a disliked minority, but they faced serious persecution—beatings and death by any number of gruesome methods. Yet nothing could shake them from their story, They willingly went to their deaths triumphantly proclaiming that Jesus had risen! Why? Because they had seen Jesus; they knew it was true! And within a generation the gospel had spread across the Roman empire, and beyond!

So yes, I hope you believe with all your heart that the message of the gospel is true, and you can't imagine living any other way. I also hope that the three evidences presented here serve to make your faith even firmer, and give you something to talk about with non-believers!

Mission Trip to Kenya By Dan Kuntz It is really hard to write a brief article about what we did for two weeks half a world away. Hopefully this gives a good idea of how blessed we were on a mission trip where we were there to help others.

After a long 19 hours of flying, with a very short layover in Istanbul, we landed in Nairobi, tired but ready to begin our adventure. There were a total of 55 participants from the Northern California Conference, 22 of which were from Ukiah. We spent a few extra minutes and dollars visiting with customs officials before we loaded up the four buses full of suitcases, VBS material and exhausted travelers. From Ukiah to the hotel in Bomet, Kenya we had been traveling for 36 hours!

After off-loading at the hotel, some chose to relax and try to adjust to the 13-hour time difference. The rest went in a bus to the school site, Kimogoro Adventist School. Our drive to the school was only 12 miles, but it took about 90 minutes. Once we left the state highway, it was rock and dirt roads the entire way. When we pulled onto the school grounds, we took the opportunity to see the work site: a cement floor with one ring of concrete block, rebar and metal framing.

The task looked daunting and we weren't sure if we could complete the building before we were to leave nine days later.

After leaving the construction site, we made our way to the classrooms. The old classrooms were made of boards and sheet metal roofs. The school has Kindergarten through the 9th grade. Some grades have as many as 49 students in a single grade! At UJA, we have 22 in our largest classroom and it has two grades in that classroom. The staff and students were so welcoming and excited that we were at their campus. All too soon we had to load up the bus and head back to our hotel, have dinner and worship, before falling asleep exhausted.

The next morning, upon our arrival, there was a huge warm welcome, including many songs and smiles. After worship, it was time to go lay cement blocks. Over the next few days, the walls were quickly rising to the point we needed scaffolding. In the afternoons, many of our students would go to VBS and perform a play for the Kenyan students. Some students helped with an eyeglass clinic. The clinic met at surrounding Adventist churches. Students said it was wonderful to see immediate results; people could see and read again!

Our NCC group was getting so proficient at laying cement block that we actually finished early, which was to be two new classrooms! We worked on a retaining wall and painted the church.

On the last day, it was time to dedicate the new classroom, but the rains that had been held back the entire time we constructed the building, finally let loose with biblical proportions. We had to move the celebrations to the church. Students and faculty sang and praised God for the good work He had done through us. Before we left California, the Kenyan teachers had put a wishlist together. Many of us brought gifts and educational materials that the teachers longed to have. The staff gave each one of us Maasai blankets. They put them over our shoulders and gave us a hug and smile. The Headmaster, Mr. Shadrack, told me that, "What you have done in a few days will make a difference in hundreds of students' lives for decades to come, or until Jesus calls us Home." That really put our work into perspective.

There was a small break in the rain, so we said brief goodbyes and loaded the buses. The ride back to the hotel was quiet, as we were thinking how we had been blessed and what we had done for them. Most of us acknowledged that we were unlikely to meet them again until we walk the streets of gold in heaven.

One thing that stood out to all of us in our observations, both at the school and as we rode to and from the school, is how happy and content people are with so little "stuff" in life. It puts into perspective how much we have compared to those in rural Kenya. Also...maybe...how we could do without some of the material possessions we cling to so dearly.

The next morning, we left for the Maasai Mara to do a day and a half safari. God's creations were astounding. We spent the rest of the day and Sabbath in awe of the beautiful animals of the savanna: elephants, giraffes, lions, leopards, cheetahs, warthogs (pumbas), all manner of gazelle and antelope, water buffalo, hippopotamus, crocodiles, zebras, hyenas, monkeys and baboons. Our safari drivers got us amazingly close. Our group cannot wait for heaven when we do not have to fear these amazing creatures.


Sunday before we flew out, we were able to visit a giraffe sanctuary. We were able to hand feed giraffes and get up close and personal, eye to eye. Additionally, we visited a bead facility where widowed Maasai women make a living by making beads and other figurines and jewelry. It was wonderful to see these women able to stand on their own when circumstances and culture would have left them abandoned and alone.

Finally, all the building, VBS, singing, safari and site seeing was done and it was time to go home! The reverse trip didn't seem as bad as going to Kenya, but the jet lag was reportedly much worse! All in all, the exhaustion was worth it! Everyone reported that they would go back. We would all love to see what the school looks like when all the construction is complete. It's more likely that we will have to wait for heaven, and we hope that comes sooner rather than later!

## From Caleb:

These past 11 years at UJA have given me some of the best experiences anyone could ask for. I began my time at UJA in 2014 in Kindergarten with Mrs. Garibaldi and Mrs. Olivera as my teachers. I recall learning how to read in that year and making many new friends with all the classmates. In 1st grade, Mrs. Beddoe introduced us to many reading, writing, math, and scientific concepts. Ms. Morris, in my 2nd, 3d and 4th grade years, greatly expounded upon and increased my skills and knowledge of math and science. In retrospect, I see those years as creating foundational bonds that would serve through the next period— middle school. We played a lot of football and various games, making our bonds as classmates even stronger. These middle school years were some of the most fun and memorable times of my life. We did many things ranging from surfing, to snowboarding, to a basketball team, and making huge progress in our academic skills. These last two years in high school have also had a significant impact on me by having increased academics and trying new things: like a football team, going to "Freshmore," and even canoeing and back-packing trips have all allowed me to branch out and create new bonds with people from other areas. As I continue on next year to Rio Lindo, eventually Walla Walla and hopefully Loma Linda, I will carry these memories, connections, and love of God anywhere else He leads me.

As I slid into the water with my snorkel and mask on, I was excited to dive into the Pacific Ocean again after ten years of teaching

in Indiana. As I swam around the Mendocino Headlands, something was very wrong. I saw almost no kelp. Then, I came across a kelp forest with millions of purple sea


urchins decimating a kelp bed. All the kelp blades were gone, and only some chewed-up stalks remained. As I looked closer at the stalks, I could see emaciated abalones trying to climb them to find food. The bodies of the Abalones were about half the size of the shells. I had never seen them look like this.

I started to look for sea stars, as I had yet to find one. Two hours later, I found only two in an area that should have had thousands. The sea stars had all died during an epidemic of sea star-wasting disease in 2013-14. By 2017, when I returned to the California coast to be the Director of the Albion Field Station, very few sea stars were left.

When an ecosystem loses a top predator, it will have drastic

consequences. Sea stars are the main predators of purple urchins. Once the urchins lost their main predator, their offspring had a greater chance of survival. Only 10-40% of eggs become fertilized, as urchins reproduce with broadcast spawning. This might sound like a low success rate, but each urchin will release up to two million eggs. Because of this kind of potential, it was only a few years before the numbers of urchins were far greater than the available food supply. This resulted in a boombust cycle, as the urchins became so populated that they all starved to death after they consumed all of the kelp, which is their food source. Then, as the urchins starved, a disease ran through the population, killing most of them. The few remaining would feed on the small amount of kelp left and grow strong enough to breed, starting the cycle over again.

As there are only two main predators of sea urchins capable of reducing the population: sea stars and sea otters, we need one of those to return in numbers sufficient to control the urchin population.

The sea otter is extinct in our area, so they will not return soon. The small population in Monterey Bay has remained at about 400 otters for the last twenty years, as diseases, such as Parovirus from cats and predators, such as juvenile white sharks, have been keeping the otters from expanding this population beyond Monterey Bay.

As it has been ten years since the sea star population crash, we are now seeing some improvement in their populations. Two sea star species killed in large numbers by the bacteria involved, the Bat star and the Broad-rayed star, have returned to a significant population. The Ochre star is more common than it was eight years ago when I returned to the coast, yet it is still only a fraction of the population it once was.

The most significant loss has been in the large Sunflower star species genus *Pycnopodia*, the fastest sea star. An adult, being a meter across and having 24 arms, allows it to prey upon urchins in a

big way. Because their population has been so decimated, they have been declared critically endangered. Scientists and volunteers, who are trying to help them recover, have been documenting their hopeful recovery on the inaturalist website.

In the last year, about three Sunflower stars have been reported north of us near Eureka. Three or four have been reported near Mendocino. One of these has been seen many times in a group of tide pools in a cave. There is one in Mendocino that is the only one in California seen more than once, since it was first reported on April 6, 2024 by myself, and was still there in the same cave last week when I saw it and photographed it



again. It had grown from 6 cm a year ago to 18 cm in diameter. Some of the biologists who visit and work out of Albion Field Station from Moss Landing Marine Labs, are developing protocols for breeding them, so that one day we may be able to release them back into the environment, as we do with salmon.

All of this is, for me, a way for us to care for the earth that God gave us to look after.
