A Powerful Testimony

In the late 70s or early 80s, the church had an annual fund-raising program in which groups would go to residential areas of the city and sing carols and ask for donations. It is important, for the sake of this narrative, to indicate that this was "BC—Before Cellphones."

It was early December, when it was dark by 6:30 and the temperature could fall 20 degrees at sunset, when it was cloudless. It was time for Ingathering. We would meet at the gym, split into our groups, and head out to a pre-selected neighborhood. The purpose was to sing carols and ask for donations for this community Christmas effort. Then, we would return to the gym for hot cocoa or cider and tally our donations. The solicitors would get a good feeling if they received a \$5 or \$10 dollar donation. (Remember this was in the late 70s or early 80s).

This particular year, I was in charge of the sixth-graders, which was quite fun. They were enthused to be the pre- and post-guards with flashlights to warn any traffic of the walking carolers. Our neighborhood to canvass was from Luce to Washington and from Dora to Helen. We had a convoy of four or five cars and met on Marwen to start. I was the last to arrive. The other adults and children were waiting for us on the sidewalk. I parked and as I watched my group cross the street, I went around and locked my car doors. (There were no remote key fobs to control the door locks). My focus was more on the children than what I was actually doing.

As I got to my driver's door, I pushed the lock down, depressed the button on the outside handle, and shut the door, but it didn't latch or lock. I opened the door and tried to figure out what the problem was. Not finding a problem, I repeated the procedure. The door did not lock. I was somewhat aware of a noise in the background, but my attention was focused elsewhere. Again, I examined where the problem might be. And for the third time, I depressed the lock, pushed in the exterior latch, and shut the door. This time, before the door actually shut, I recognized the sound coming from my car, to inform me that my keys were still in the ignition. However, my efforts of locking the door were successful. I tried the door and it was secure. I walked around my car trying all of the doors. Peering through the passenger-side window, I could see my keys firmly inserted in the ignition.

At that time, the door locks had a mushroom-shaped head, so if something stiff, yet pliable, could be fashioned into a hook, you could maneuver it under the mushroom, lift up, and unlatch the lock. I walked over to the other drivers and inquired if anyone had a wire coat hanger. Unfortunately, none of them could produce one. Walking back to my car, I tried to come up with a solution to get my car unlocked, so I could rejoin the carolers to do what I had come to do. Nothing was coming to me—a lot of thoughts, but none of them fruitful. I leaned against my car and wondered.

Then. . .looking down at the ground, right below my driver's door, on the pavement, was a wire coat hanger. Picking it up, straightening it out, and then bending it into a hook configuration, I was able to work it between the weather-stripping and underneath the mushroom head of the door lock. Within a few minutes, I had rejoined the carolers with my car locked and the keys in my pocket.

The rest of the evening, I was comparing the hanger to Jesus and how it had given me my freedom. I also realized that no matter where I had parked, the wire hanger would have been there.

Since that time, I have come to know and love God so much more. The first thing I can witness to was that at no time did I pray, except to thank Him afterward. Before that, it was all me trying to work out my solution. What also dawned on me was the placement of the hanger. It was not on the sidewalk, or in the gutter, or under my car, but right below my driver's door.

The most significant thoughts that I have had, as I have replayed this scene in my mind, were these: God didn't wait until I got it right to provide for me. He was with me all the time. He knew I needed something more than me, and that I needed to both pick up and use the hanger.

No, the hanger didn't provide for me an eternity with my Savior and my God, but it did give me a profound awareness of His love and care for me at that moment.




Jordan, we are proud of the young man you have become: always learning, working hard, and volunteering to help others. We have loved traveling with you on your journey, and we know that God has plans for you.
