In September, I was on the yearly outdoor education science trip to Yosemite with the 7th and 8th grade class. Mr. Kuntz takes his science students there for a few days in the fall. The goal was to have them experience the natural world while studying it, rather than just reading about it in a textbook. Experiencing the stunning natural beauty and the sense of wonder that it evokes creates a love for nature and an interest in the science behind it. It also can't help but point us in the direction of the Designer who made it all. Worships around the campfire were somehow much more meaningful out there. Both Mr. Kuntz and Ms. Krystalynn created an experience for the students that will not soon be forgotten.


I went on the trip with the high school students on another mission. I planned two days of epic hikes for them in the wilderness that would push their limits. The first day's hikes would be tough. We would start at the bottom of Yosemite Valley (4,000 ft. elevation) and hike to the top of Upper Yosemite Falls (6,600 ft.). It's a very steep 4-mile hike to the top of the falls. The students were apprehensive about it. This was more than any of them had done before, and some were not sure they could make it.

The weather that day was great. The sun was shining, and the valley floor was magnificent. We got a bit of a late start, but we all headed out with the anticipation of stunning views from the top. It wasn't long before I noticed that a few students were eager to go faster. I knew that the trail was well marked and let them go ahead with one of the chaperones.

The trail was steep, rocky, and relentless. After a mile or so, one of my students was slowing down. I stayed with one while the others went ahead. About halfway up, we stopped at a viewpoint and looked up. The top of the falls still seemed far away.

"Look how far we still have to go!" the student said.

"Look how far you've come!" I replied, pointing down to the valley below.



"Oh, wow!" was the student's reply.

There's a life lesson here, I thought to myself.

Encouraged, we continued on and made it to the top. The view was amazing, and we enjoyed our time there, looking down at how far we'd come.

All too often, I find myself focusing more on what I haven't done, and less on what I have. It can be discouraging.

I wonder if I do the same sort of thing in my walk with God? When I get discouraged with my relationship with Him, why do I forget to look back and see how far we've come together? It is so uplifting when I do remember the times I have felt His presence; when I do remember His care for me and His guidance in my life.
